January 4 1934 Eagle Rock Advertiser -Torrential rains of the storm of Saturday and Sunday made a raging torrent of the Eagle Rock Slough, which leads up in to the hills and empties into the meager storm drains provided. The angry waters mounting higher as the storm continued, made families homeless, undermined houses, garages and cut through the Yosemite playgrounds, leaving tons of rock and earth in its path...

Work Ends This Week On Drain

November 29, 1937 Eagle Rock Advertiser-Work on the Yosemite storm drain project which has been under construction since Nov. 6, 1935, will be wound up this week and 89 WPA workers, the remaining few of a large crew, will be transferred to other projects, it was learned from WPA headquarters in Los Angeles Friday. Work will end Tuesday. During the last few weeks, catch basins in the East section of Eagle Rock have been completed, as has the pouring of a 45 inch concrete monolithic arch, filling, flooding and resurfacing. Cleaning up and dismantling buildings at Floristan Avenue which have been used as field offices storage, etc., will also be completed.

The drain construction stops considerably short of the original plans. In the east section it was planned to install laterals north of Colorado Boulevard to Hill Drive and also more laterals in the N. Figueroa section. The work stops short of these.

Eagle Rock's Freeway Revolt

Las Flores Drive is about 20 feet wide. curb-to-curb. It is one of the narrowest streets to run contiguously for as long as it does, and to also feature sidewalks on both sides of the street. It's no surprise people sometimes mistake it for an alley; it really is a quaint street. However, without community engagement, there is a good



along Chickasaw Avenue, while the other two placed the freeway north of the boulevard, with one along Las Flores Drive and the other along Hill Drive.

These routes were immediately opposed by a substantial portion of the neighborhood, including local elected officials and the Chamber of Commerce. Hundreds of people attended meetings lasting

chance the street would not exist in its tranquil state, if at all.

134 Freeway Plans Take Shape

In the 1950s, plans to complete the 134 Freeway (then referred to as the Colorado Boulevard Freeway) started to take shape. At this point, the freeway already ran through Burbank and Pasadena, but it did not yet go through Glendale or Eagle Rock. Initially, there were a few routing configurations being considered for the portion through Eagle Rock. One proposal had the freeway running south of Colorado Boulevard several hours. In 1959, Eagle Rock's Assembly Representative, John Collier, boldly proclaimed that a freeway through Eagle Rock "brings no benefits" to anyone. Eagle Rock residents protested on the behalf of the numerous residents that would be displaced by the freeway routing with one local at the time stating:

"A freeway that would cut Eagle Rock in two would kill this community as a lovely residential suburb."

Vicki started playing the piano when she was seven years old. It wasn't until high school though that she began to seriously pursue her talent. She was born and raised in Minneapolis and moved to Montana at age twelve. There, in 1980, she got her undergraduate degree in

piano and later her Masters from Arizona State University. She moved to Los Angeles in 1984 and went on to receive her Doctorate from USC. She has gone on to become a Grammy nominated artist, performer with the LA Phil, head faculty member at Cal Arts, and founding member of Piano Spheres.
