
For us at the Historical Society, we are naturally looking for images of our community (both old and new) in this vast collection. The LAPL has images of

early Eagle Rock that are essential to our understanding of our community's history. Lately, the volunteers at ERVHS have been putting extra energy and time into researching the LAPL's Eagle Rock photos and making sure they are identified correctly (address/year/etc.) and/or if there is something we can learn from the information identifying the image for our own records in our archives. Have you ever taken a gander? Try it!

Where did the Eagle Rock photos come from? Security Bank, which used to have a branch on the Northeast corner of Colorado and Eagle Rock Boulevards (demolished years ago but Chase Bank stands in its wake), collected an impressive photo archive. Some of these were shared with ERVHS over the years. The entire collection was finally donated to LAPL.

So come on out! View some fabulous photos of your neighborhood, a friend's elsewhere in LA, or just for the coffee and the conversation! Learn how to navigate those millions of photographs from the comfort of your home. Looking forward to seeing you!

The other event is the 13th annual Los Angeles Archives Bazaar at the USC Doheny Memorial Library, Saturday, October 20th (laassubject. This event brings local governmental archive organizations, educational institutions and historical, genealogy and memorabilia organizations together under one roof for a free event. We will be sharing a table with our community partners; Occidental College and Highland Park Heritage Trust. There are many interesting conference sessions and a vast array of interesting expo-like displays. If you have never been, or even if you have, you should try to make it this year.

The last thing I will mention this month is the fruits of our/your work towards scanning old newspapers has born more fruit – there are more issues available on the California Digital Newspaper Collection website (cdnc. ucr.edu). You can now find all issues of the Eagle Rock Sentinel from 1910-19, 1923, 1925-30, and selected issues from 1959,1960,1964, 1980,1981 and 1985. You can also find most issues of the Eagle Rock Advertiser from 1928 to 1933. On a a personal level, I found out much more about the family, "Braasch", who built my house in 1923 and even more about the ar-

chitect/builder, "Egasse". You probably have your own keywords to search for - you don't have to limit your search to only surnames, but places or events. You can also just digitally "flip" through issues. This collection has two objectives: to provide access to digitized California newspapers and to archive the digital files of those newspapers for posterity. You can browse online without a login account, but you are encouraged to create either a free account or a low-cost paid account. The money goes to help maintain the 120 terabytes, and growing, of data stored in the archive. The project can be crowd-corrected. While you are browsing with either type of account, you can make corrections to the OCR'd (optical character recognition) text.

Our Town, Our History

Early Eagle Rock from the Security Pacific Collection/Los Angeles Public library

Eagle Rock's Second School, Completed About 1909. This new Craftsman-style brick building accommodated, for a few years, the rapidly growing population facilitated by the new trolley service and residential subdivision. It was replaced by the Eagle Rock School building facing Chickasaw Avenue in 1917





West (San Rafael) School The school was built after the 1917 Eagle Rock District bond issue mandated regional schools. Classes were held in rented rooms until a building was constructed. It was located near Broadway and El Verano. The date and circumstances of the doubling of the school are unknown. The building to the left appears to be the addition. Possibly a bathroom with outdoor access has been added to the right. The location remains an open field of wild flowers.

East School (Dahlia Heights) Another result of the 1917 bond, the building stood on the corner of Colorado and Floristan. Classes were held in the Murfield Block at Townsend and Colorado, and under a large tree in its rear, while this building was constructed. It looks very similar to the West School and may have been built by the same hands. The pillared portico and left hand end of the building survived as a kindergarten until all the buildings were torn down and replaced by today's building.

Francis R. Line in 1953 "Someday we want the Rock and its surroundings to be one of the beauty spots of the country"... "plans must await the return of peace". He built a path up the back and, for a time, opened it to sightseers. Line, a nationally known lecturer and documentary filmmaker, purchased the Rock and 13 acres around it, in 1944 from Alonzo C. Mather. Mather bought the land from the Campbell-Johnston's San Raphael Land Co. in 1925, planning to build a resort hotel.





The Egasse-Braasch House Albert Braasch was a successful heating manufacturer. He and his wife Constance hired architect Egasse to build this and several other houses on a large property on Hill Drive in Norman French style. The interior details and a large stained glass window carry through this theme. Constance is remembered by many as the neighborhood piano teacher. The house was declared an Historic Cultural Monument at the behest of the current owners, David and Myanna Dellinger.

Eagle Rock's City Hall at Christmas The date of this photograph is unknown. Folks turn out in large numbers even today to celebrate the annual tree lighting. The tree has grown a bit! The building was completed in 1923, just prior to the consolidation of Eagle Rock City with Los Angeles.
