


Some Things Never Change


As some of you have heard, Metro LA is considering transportation alternatives that include a bus lane through Eagle Rock. The Eagle Rock Valley Historical Society tries to remain non-political, preferring to preserve and remind people about the history that got us to where we are today – a vibrant and tight-knit community. Before Colorado Blvd continued through to Pasadena, and before most residents had the new automobile, Eagle Rock had a two passenger rail trolleys that both brought Eagle Rock residents to other parts of the city and to Glendale, but also brought needed customers to early businesses along Colorado Blvd. and what is now Eagle Rock Blvd (it was known as Central Avenue then). Eagle Rock had its rapid expansion period due in part because of these rail lines, and then people shifted to cars. Also, as documented in previous issues of this journal the CA 134 freeway was originally planned to go down Colorado Blvd., but residents stood up and kept it on the hill above. The point is that we adapted with the times, fought for obvious intrusions, but we still stayed a community. Whether the bus line is added or not, we need to keep an open mind and not reject just because it is different – it's not all that different after all than how we started.

For our April meeting, we had a representative of very early Eagle Rock – Timothy Poyorena-Miguel of the Kizh/Gabrielino Band of Mission Indians. The guest speaker was very adamant that his views were 100% correct and others were 100% incorrect. We had a few complaints about his "my way or the highway" views, and I apologize that we did not stress that these were his views and not necessarily the view of the Historical Society. Many current and reputable sources counter the Kizh/Gabrielino version of how history played out.

This October we have our bi-annual officer elections. These seats are always up for election: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer. We currently have no one as Secretary, so that position is completely available. If you want to step up and help in one of these capacities, please let us know prior to the October meeting so we can discuss what each position entails.

A few years ago we acquired a scrapbook on eBay. What attracted our attention were photographs of Occidental College in Highland Park and Eagle Rock. At that time we copied some significant photos but were at a loss to put the scrapbook in context or to identify the photographer.


Recently the editor was asked to produce a project for his classes' 50th reunion. In the course of this production (http://scalar.cdla.oxycreates.org/neighborhood/index- Check it out) we discovered that several of the photos were printed in Oxy's 1914 "La Encina" yearbook. The photographer was Hugh A. McNary '14. We then could identify more of the photographs taken by this tale nted and hitherto unknown photographer.

Our Town, Our History


Occidental was in its last years in Highland Park. The students shown here in 1911 were part of the class of 1914, the first that would graduate at the new campus in Eagle Rock.






The Hall of Letters, the academic center of the Highland Park campus in its heyday still stands, much altered, near the corner of Avenue 50 and Figueroa Street.

Oxy's teams still played on this field surrounded by suburban Highland Park until the new Patterson Field was ready in Eagle Rock in 1917.




Our Town, Our History
