Early Chapters in Southern California History

California history, especially that of its southern regions, is much older, and features a more diverse cast of protagonists, than just about any other part of the United States. Unfortunately, only a tiny fraction of California's present population of more than 40 million has any connection with or knowledge of the earliest chapters of our state's history. Most Californians are familiar only with the events of the past century, or even less. And, since the majority of these newcomers are monolingual English speakers, the first 300+ years of California history, all of it recorded in the Spanish language, remains largely

unknown to them. Sadly, much of what passes for this early history has been garbled, misinterpreted, or perverted by Anglo-American mythology. On February 22nd, 2022, Brian Dervin Dillon will take us on a tour of Southern California beginning in 1542 and ending in 1900. Along the way we will meet California Indians, Spanish explorers, missionaries and soldiers, and Californios of Mestizo, Mulato, and Zambo origin. Dr. Dillon will illuminate our shadowy past and demolish old, entrenched, myths about Southern California's earliest history.

Dr. Dillon is a 5th-generation Californian. An archaeologist, he is both the son and the father of historians. He has spent 50 years doing archaeological, anthropological, and culture-historical research in every part of California (46 of its 58 counties) and in four other Latin American countries. His fluency in Spanish and longstanding relationships with Native Americans allows him to offer a fresh view of Southern California History.

This Zoom presentation is based upon his most recent book, *Early Chapters in Southern California History*, published in 2021 as Keepsake No. 54 by the Los Angeles Corral of Westerners International. Physical photographs can also be donated, but please contact me/us about them. We are a bit hindered by the lack of

access to our normal archives, but will attempt to continue to accommodate physical donations, in a safe manner.

As we move into 2022, and hope that it isn't "Twenty-twenty too", we are hoping that we can start up some sort of physical or hybrid meetings sometime soon. In the meantime, we are continuing to work to maintain the history of Eagle Rock.

ERVHS History Part Two: A New Home, Historic Preservation Collaboration and Distribution

The Eagle Rock Community Cultural Center (now known as the Center for the Arts, Eagle Rock) was chartered in 1996, as the City elected to conform the management of the refurbished old Eagle Rock Library to a citywide push to form community arts organizations. Generously, then as now, this organization hosts the Historical Society. In our new home, the most pressing initial priority was to properly house and inventory our materials. As long-time president John Miller was nearly the last of the older generation still active, a new generation of leadership was needed. As we looked at our holdings it became clear that the Northeast Newspaper and Eagle Rock Advertiser archives were key holdings that needed to be shared with the public. An ongoing conversation began with our neighbors in Highland Park Heritage and Occidental Collage to accomplish this. At the same time, increasing concern led us to examine our role in historic preservation efforts. Our public presence continued to evolve, with the addition of the Ice Cream Social event, hosting the community, in addition to our quarterly meetings (continuing on Zoom) and our newsletter. We seek new collaborators in the community to enhance our effectiveness and continue our archival and educational work.

Our Town, Our History



Mel Harte writes “James B. McNary & Jennie C. McNary built this home after WWI and according to grandpa McNary it cost \$3500 to build, including cobblestone fireplace and porch columns. The McNarys lived in the house until the middle ‘30s, then they moved to the converted garage in the rear to make room for family members”. The house, on Eagle Rock Boulevard, was threatened by condominium development. The Eagle Rock Valley Historical Society and TERA (The Eagle Rock Association), with the aid of Charles J. Fisher, obtained Historic Cultural Monument status in 2007. (1962 Survey-ERVHS)

This collection along with the microfilmed Northeast Newspapers and Eagle Rock Advertiser formed the core of a collaborative effort between Occidental College, The Highland Park Heritage Trust and ERVHS to store, catalog and make available these immensely important historic resources to the public.
